### From the Rev. Claire Kiddy:

I am writing this 'letter' on the first anniversary of my licensing as Priest in Charge of the Upper Alde Benefice. Little did I realise on that night a year ago I would be licensed and installed as Rector of the benefice, nine months later. It has been a year of joys and challenges and I can't quite make up my mind on whether it has been a quick year or not. Time is rather like that, it speeds up, flies past and yet when you are rooted in the present the time seems slower. It is difficult to think of the time when I didn't belong in this benefice. In some ways I am pleased to have made it through the year and to have experienced the rhythm of life, seasonally and liturgically in each parish. On the other hand, I no longer have the excuse of being new in the parish when I make a mistake! Time is both slow and fast.

Our journey through life is the same, I look back on my life through the lens of being a wife, mother and priest which makes anything that happened before that difficult to imagine. Life experience adds layers to our understanding of who we are, so when I remember being a child, I am doing so with my life experience since that time. Yet sometimes we are shocked when we realise that something which seems recent in our life is 10 or 20 years ago. How time flies then!

The beginning of the academic year is a new beginning in lots of different ways for many of us, we don't have to be in education ourselves for it to have an impact on our life. The pattern of our common life is set by academic terms, a new rhythm in our life might be set by children or grandchildren in school, or our work in school or a myriad of other reasons.

The seasons of the year are reflected in the different merchandise stocked on supermarket shelves which seem to speed the year up – and yes Christmas foods available to buy before the end of August.

The turning of summer into autumn adds to the speed of life, can those new green leaf shoots really be turning orange so soon? I think we have to be intentional about noticing the vibrancy of autumn and slowing down to appreciate the season we are in. I am sure this newsletter will be filled with all that is going on in each of our parishes and there will be lots of dates to put in your diaries. But I encourage you not to be so rushed along with it all that you miss those little joys of life which are all around us. *Revd Claire Hut.*

### Sweffling Parish Council News

The draft minutes of the meeting held on September 9<sup>th</sup> have been posted on the village notice board at the end of Holden's Lane. Items discussed included an update of flood prevention, Jubilee field, dog fouling in the village, grit bins and defibrillator training. The possibility of obtaining funding for two village items was discussed with the District Councillor, Vince Langdon Morris, who was present at the meeting.

Following Councillor Ashurst's departure from the village and the subsequent advertisements for new Councillors on the village notice board and the village website, an application was received from Eleanore Fitzgerald. Her CV had been circulated to all Councillors who had considered and approved her application.

There is currently **one further vacancy for a parish councillor**. If you would like to apply, please contact Peter Grogan, the Parish Clerk on [clerk@sweffling-pc.gov.uk](mailto:clerk@sweffling-pc.gov.uk) and he will advise what information needs to be provided.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday, November 11<sup>th</sup> at 7.30 p.m. in Sweffling Hut. All village members are invited to attend this meeting. The agenda for the meeting will be posted on the village notice board ahead of the meeting.

### Matters arising from the Parish Council meeting

#### 1. Dog fouling.

It has been brought to the notice of the Parish Council that people walking their dogs around the village, and particularly on the Jubilee field are not cleaning up after their animals. As children play on the field and walking is encouraged, **PLEASE ENSURE** that you clean up any dog mess. There are bins provided around the village into which bags can be deposited, i.e. by the gate on Jubilee field, on the side of the road behind the Townland Meadow pavilion, at the bottom of the footpath by the front of Church, at the end of Holden's Lane close to the village notice board, and adjacent to the footpath that goes from Rectory Hill across the field towards Great Glemham. There is no excuse, therefore, not to take a bag, pick up after your dog and leave the bag in a suitable bin.

#### 2. Defibrillator training.

St John's Ambulance have been contacted and have agreed to provide training on the use of the defibrillator, which is now installed outside Sweffling Hut. The training will probably be on a Saturday morning, date to be confirmed. Instruction in CPR will also be given. It is hoped that as many people as possible will attend the training session. One never knows when live-saving help might be needed.

### 3. Flood maintenance.

A reminder to householders of Riparian rights and responsibilities, i.e. if your property borders onto a watercourse you are responsible for maintaining the length of the watercourse adjacent to your property such that the water can flow freely.

## Nature Notes October/November 2025



This may be the last Nature Notes from Dernford, if our move to Framlingham finally happens. The Editor wants them to continue, so I am working out how to do this. Another good excuse to come back and visit the old haunts?

Several people have asked me about a plant with a pretty bright blue flower, on the verge opposite the Townland meadow.

Sometimes verge plants after cutting have a second flowering, so perhaps it will still be showing in October. This is Chicory, not strictly a native plant, but what botanists call an archaeophyte, a plant introduced in the distant past. It was long cultivated for fodder, and its

roots were roasted and ground as an additive to coffee.

(A factory near Lakenheath was doing this up until the 1980's). You may be able to see in the picture a small, dark, solitary bee, gathering the blue pollen. In the same verge is another late flowering plant, the Tansy, with its heads of bright yellow button flowers, and a strong, pleasant scent when you crush the leaves.

Singing Robins have been very much in evidence this September, and will be going on into the winter. A few

of our birds sing occasionally at this time of year – a wren has been singing in our garden – but they don't persist. The theory is that the length of day is similar to that in their breeding

season, which fools their brains into triggering song, although only briefly. Robins are different. Their winter song is, as in the spring, intended to advertise and defend a territory. This is not designed, as it is in spring, to provide a resource for the pair to raise their broods, but to provide a single bird with a secure supply of food and shelter. It is more commonly, but not always, a male which stays, (many of the females migrate southwards, sometimes as far as France, for the winter). The winter song which you will hear is different from that of the

spring, quieter and, people say, more melancholy sounding. If a female is the winter guardian, then she will sing, just like the male, most unusual in the bird world. Migrant birds return, and pairs re-form, towards the end of the winter.

At the time of writing most of our summer migrants have already departed southwards. The Swifts have long gone (early August), but the later broods of Swallows and House Martins (very few of the latter this year) may still be around to be seen into October.

It always surprises me that so few of the huge crop of Blackberries are eaten by birds, although they are sugar-rich, and must be very nutritious. You may see Blackbirds eating them, or Bluetits pecking them for their seeds, but most of them are left dry and withered by the end of autumn. In fact many are eaten by small mammals, Wood mice and Bank voles, which can climb well, and the larger Foxes and Badgers. In winter I have seen the dry seeds eaten by Bullfinches, which specialise in taking seeds from plant stems.

## Report of Fete Wash-up Meeting

The Wash-up meeting following this year's fete was held in Sweffling Hut on Thursday, September 18<sup>th</sup>. It was chaired by Geoff and Katy Boulton, who have agreed to co-ordinate the Fete for 2026. Geoff welcomed those who were present and expressed everyone's thanks to Jill Abbott who had stepped into the breach and co-ordinated the fete after the departure of Steve and Sue Ashurst. Jill, in turn, thanked all those in the village, and visitors, who had worked so hard before and after the fete. Geoff said that it had been a very enjoyable and happy day, which had brought the village together. He then went through a list of the stalls and attractions and asked for comments as to what went well and where improvements might be made for next year. He again thanked all stall holders for their efforts and the personal contributions that they had made.

The total of profit of approximately £3600, although slightly lower than in 2024, was still an excellent amount. According to the fete constitution, half of the money will be donated to the church, the remaining money is available for distribution to village organisations, with a small amount available for a village project, if a suitable project is proposed
