#### From the Reverend Martin Percival

A Rabbi once asked God, 'How is it that people no longer hear You speaking to them?' God replied, 'Because they don't bow down low enough.'

When I heard this for the first time I was reminded of how, when speaking with young children, we often bend or even kneel down so that we are on the same level as them. Why do we do this? We do it so that we are best able to hear more

clearly what they are saying. If we apply this to our conversations with God and wonder why we don't hear Him speaking to us, it may be because we don't get into the right position and the reason for this might be that we don't really want to hear what He is telling us. It is not that God is not speaking but rather that we are not listening. We don't mind listening to God as long as He is telling us things that we want to hear. It's surprising how very passionate and committed Christians often hear God speaking to them in words that fit in with their plans and schemes.

Another reason we bend down to speak with children is to avoid distraction because children sometimes speak quietly and, usually with so much going on around, it's difficult to catch what they are saying. We need to focus on them alone. However, when it comes to speaking with God people are sometimes quite content to have as many distractions as possible because they do not find prayer easy. We would rather be doing things, getting on with the job, than just sitting or kneeling there speaking with God and so 'doing' is often a good excuse for not listening. Of course, if we are not listening then we are not going to hear what He has to say.

The last reason for kneeling down when speaking with children is to get on the same level and not to loom over the top of them. Also to kneel or to bow is to express humility. The period leading up to Easter, which we call Lent and which will begin this month, is all about humbling ourselves before God and being truly sorry for our wrongdoing and the injury we have caused to others. Holy Scripture tells us that 'A broken and contrite heart God will not despise' and so we are invited to humble ourselves before God. This, of course, is the very last thing that most of us want to do and so we continue to stand proud and tall in our self-centredness and self-delusion.

Perhaps we should be encouraged to humble ourselves before God and bow down low so that we can hear Him speaking to us. It is worth remembering that there would have been no Easter had God not humbled Himself by becoming a child on earth and then being humiliated and crucified. So, let's try to follow in His footsteps and bow our knees, like the Magi, so that we might hear the Christ-Child speaking to us. *Martin*.

#### **Information regarding Covid Vaccinations**

Hopefully by the time you read this, the majority of people in Sweffling in the high-risk categories will have received their first Covid injection. However, the following information may be useful:

Covid-19 Vaccination – (Fram Practice patients) - Suffolk GP Fed website: A senior doctor from the Suffolk GP Federation, which is running the COVID-19 vaccination programme for 28 of the county's 62 GP practices, today said all patients over 80 will have been contacted by the end of this week. Patients who have a mobile phone will receive a text and those who do not are being posted first-class letters. The texts and letters will enable patients to book an appointment to be vaccinated against COVID-19.

We are currently receiving a very high number of calls regarding the vaccination programme. Framlingham surgery was not chosen as a vaccination site and, as explained on our telephone message and website, therefore, we have no control over the COVID vaccination programme. This is being co-ordinated by NHS England and delivered via the chosen vaccination organisations/sites. We do appreciate that our patients are anxious to receive the vaccine and are finding the current communication channels difficult, however, we have no

additional information other than that provided on our website. Please be assured that we will update our website with any information provided on a regular basis, however, we are unable to respond to individual enquiries as this severely impairs our ability to deliver day to day care Thank you

#### Nature Notes - February - March 2021



For the last few winters our bird feeders have attracted the small finches called Redpolls. They use the feeders which are designed to hold the tiny black Nyger seeds and to dispense these to birds with small, pointed beaks. We installed them a few years ago in the hope of attracting Goldfinches, which they did within a few hours, but in subsequent winters also numbers of Repolls and the other small winter-visiting finch, the Siskin. Both these finches are mostly seen in

the winter, but in East Anglia they are also found as breeding birds, particularly in areas of Birch or Pine. But so far this year, up to the time of writing, both finches have been completely absent from the garden. The stock answers to this are usually that for some reason the birds have not migrated here from the continent, or that there is so much natural food in the district that they have no need yet of visiting gardens. In fact, I have seen flocks of

Redpolls already feeding in the tops of local Birch trees.

Have a look at the twigs of the Birch, and you will see what is their attraction. The new catkins, which are the male flowers, will soon ripen and shed their pollen. The bigger catkins are the females, whose seeds ripened in the autumn, and are still available into the winter. These seeds are



tiny, each equipped with wings, and are produced in large numbers along the length of the catkin. Thus there is a lot of food for birds available here, but only for those which have small, delicate beaks and are very light and acrobatic – in practice the tits and smaller finches. This year's female catkins develop later. By the river, look for the same thing on the Alder trees. The

large male catkins will be producing their pollen soon. The familiar woody fruits, which look like miniature Pinecones, are the female 'catkins' and are ripening about now. Next year's female catkins can be seen as tiny buds at the tip of some of the twigs. Again, their seeds are suitable food for tits and small finches, which can get their beaks into the 'cones'. Traditionally, these seeds are over by mid-February, which is when the Siskins in particular tend to visit garden bird feeders.




In this rather wet winter, the River Alde has risen onto the low floodplain meadows for much of the time. This has attracted a few ducks, mainly Mallard, and a few gulls. The gulls, mainly Black-headed Gulls (look for them starting to



get their black heads anytime from February), but also a few Common Gulls and Herring Gulls. They seem to be feeding mostly around the edges of the floodwater, where I presume they are taking creatures such as earthworms, displaced by the water. Often there has also been a Heron, usually an

immature bird, greyer and with less of the

striking black and white of the adult on its head and neck. When we first came to Swefling there were Herons nesting high in a tree by the river, but the tree has since died and fallen, and I have not seen signs of nesting since.

occasions seen a Kingfisher, on the stretch above the Benhall bridge. My impression is that there are only low numbers of small fish here, and I would not expect Kingfishers to be common, but some people disagree with me, so keep your eyes open. The Kingfisher makes a loud, shrill piping call when it flies, giving you a

good warning that one is about. Another favourite thing of mine is the Kingcup, or Marsh Marigold, which grows in early spring along the river Alde and some its ditches. Look out for its large, bright yellow, buttercup flowers from March onwards.

## **Alde Community Council Spring Flower Show**

The ACC announced last month its intention to hold its Spring Flower Show in early April. The intention is undiminished and it is still envisaged that it will go ahead, either in Sweffling village hut, or on Sweffling town field. The precise date and venue for the show depends on the COVID regulations which will be in force in April. That is 2 months away. We can hope that is long enough for the covid threat to diminish and the rules to be relaxed, remembering the saying back in September, "it will surely be over by Christmas" (ref, WW1).

There is much to be said positively about the show. First and foremost, participation is not limited to ACC members. Secondly, it is intended to be enjoyable for the growers, spectators and all participants. There is a broad format to the show to give it some order. All entries have to be at the site by 10.00am. No entry after that time. Judging will begin at 10.00 am, no-one except the judge will be present. The show will open at 2.00pm Prize giving at 3.00pm followed by raffle. There are a wide variety of classes for entries covering seasonal flowers, displays and arrangements, with special sections for young exhibitors, up to 10, and up to 15. I have the following available currently & will be making more while stocks of Seville oranges last.

- \* Classic Seville orange
- \* Orange with Sherry
- \* Old fashioned Oxford marmalade ( slightly darker as uses part Demerara sugar & peel chopped in chunks)
- \* Dark & stormy with rum
- \* Dark & stormy (this style is very dark, uses some dark muscovado sugar & contains ginger & some lime juice from fresh limes)
- \* Lemon
- \* Lemon with gin
- \* Honeyed pink grapefruit

Also Apple & cranberry chutney (left over from Christmas that never happened!). This is nice with cheese & biscuits or great as an alternative to apple sauce with pork.

I will be making some fresh lemon curd over the coming weeks. As this has a shelf life of only 1 month I will make this according to any orders.
