**Up-date on the Inter-regnum:** Following the retirement of the Rev. Percival, two formal meeting have been held, which set in motion the search for a new priest for our Benefice. The vacant post has been advertised on the diocesan web-site and at the time of going to press one application has been received. At the beginning of June, the prospective candidate will visit the six parishes and meet with the churchwardens and PCCs, and this will be followed by a formal interview. This approach gives both the candidate and the Benefice the opportunity to assess whether they are right for each other. Hopefully we will know by mid-June whether or not we have a new priest. In the meantime, service will continue as before.

Lent Soup Lunch: Our annual Lent Soup Lunch, held in Sweffling Hut on March 23<sup>rd</sup>, was very successful. There were ten different varieties of soup, vegetarian, non-vegetarian and gluten free options so everyone was well provided for. It was an excellent opportunity to meet friends and chat whilst enjoying a delicious ready-prepared lunch. The proceeds from the lunch and the raffle amounted to £400 and this has been sent to Tearfund to help with Famine relief. Thanks to everyone who made soup, those who helped on the day and to everyone who supported this event.

Easter Sunday: For the Benefice service on Easter Sunday the scent of lilies filled St. Mary's church, each lily given in memory of a family member or friend. The beautiful Easter gardens reminded us of the first Easter day when Christ rose from the dead. The church was filled to capacity as we welcomed the Rural Dean, the Rev, Chris Davey and the Rev. Deidre West, who jointly conducted the service of Holy Communion. The benefice choir led the singing of familiar Easter hymns and also sang the introit "This joyful Eastertide" and the anthem "God so loved the world" It was a splendid occasion, a fitting celebration of the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ. After the service there was the opportunity to enjoy refreshments and Easter eggs!! Thank you to all those who helped to arrange the lilies, to make the Easter Gardens and to everyone who took part in the service and provided refreshments.

#### **Sweffling St Mary's Church, Annual Church Meeting:**

The Annual Church meeting was held on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> May at 6.00 p.m. in Church. Mr. Geoffrey Abbott and Professor John Tesh were reelected as church wardens. Each churchwarden gave a short report on the work of the church during the year. Church life in Sweffling continues to be very active both within the village and much further afield. A minimum of two services are held each month, with special services at intervals. Dr. Anne Fitzgerald holds Sunday School in conjunction with each service when there are children in the congregation. Fund raising events for the church included a very enjoyable concert by "5 in a bar", the annual "Christmas Brass" Concert by the Leiston Royal British Legion Brass Band and the Christmas Brunch and Market. The "out-reach" programme continues strongly with charity fund-raising events including the Lent Soup Lunch and the Harvest Lunch. A total of £1400 was sent to Tear Fund for disaster and famine relief. We also continue to support the hospital in The Gambia.

The programme of church and churchyard maintenance continues. A big thank you to all the willing, and usually unseen, volunteers who look after our church so well, inside and outside. The church share of £1500 from the Village Fete last year went towards payment of a bill of £6100 for repairs to the tower both inside and out — louvres, stonework and pointing, and to rebuilding the southwest buttress of the porch.

#### Red Barn Farm, Badingham

**Red Barn Farm** was the focus for hundreds of people on Thursday 9th May for the Thanksgiving Service for the life of a very popular gentleman. It followed a burial service in Badingham Church Chancel. **Robert Frank Foster (Bob)** came with his family to Red Barn at the age of four. The family assembled at the church on their first Sunday in Badingham and the children joined the choir.

Bob spent his life on inventfully working the farm, keeping it locally the best farm, receiving many accolades. The farm was renown for its crops of thatching straw.

Ann and Bob were married in 1967. He leaves two sons; Hayden and Graham.

He was on the Parish and Church Councils for many years, volunteering for various projects for both. He also did emergency work for the County Council. In between farm work, Bob and his brother John invented the Fossegent, (a mechanical scarecrow that waved its arms driven by a tractor battery).



The giant bikes down in the hedgerow 'just for fun' are also something that kept busy fingers at work. People will remember far and wide the 'carol wagon' at bye gone Christmas times. It raised funds for the Children's Society. It was an adapted and decorated tractor & trailer transporting singers around local (and not so local) villages. The November the 5th bonfires were partly thanks to Bob as were many other occasions, like the Cross on the church at Christmas. He was voted to become Churchwarden several years ago, and though reluctant, he did this duty perfectly and fully. When we found the problems with the roof, he was the first to get to grips with situation. He and Ann took on the arrangements of meetings that were very strange to us rural people. He 'supervised' the scaffolders in the Nave to guard against damage to the other parts. He took on the maintenance of the

trees which seem not to like the climate changing or their old age! To the extent that the week before he when into hospital he and a couple of helpers burnt up the top of a tree that had fallen in a recent gale! They say; "no one is indispensible" but, have we just seen the passing of one?


